# **HOW TO:**REPLACE CABINET HARWARE

Switching out your cabinet handles, knobs, and hinges is the fastest and easiest way to bring life back into a dated kitchen.



## **Project Overview:**

#### **Tools and Materials:**

Screwdriver

Replacement Cabinet Hardware

Replacement Hinges

Ruler

Putty Knife

Drill

Drill Bit Set

Wood Safe Household Cleanser

Sanding Sponge Wood Filler



#### Instructions:

- Count the number of pulls, hinges, and knobs for all of the cabinets and doors. Take note if your cabinets and doors have different kind of hardware.
- Unscrew the hardware, including one hinge from a cabinet door. This will entail removing the door. If your cabinets have two types of pulls or knobs, remove one of each.
- Take the cabinet door, the pull or knob, and the hinge to your local Foxworth-Galbraith to find new hardware.
- Coordinate new hardware with the color and style of your cabinets. Purchase all the hardware you will need.
- This project is easiest with new hardware that will fit in the holes of the old hardware.
- If you want a style that does not fit the original holes, you will need to fill the current holes using wood filler and a putty knife.
   Then, using a ruler, measure both x and y coordinates for the new holes. Drill new holes and proceed.
- Unscrew all of the old hardware from the cabinets.
- Put on the new hinges, using a screwdriver.
- Remount the cabinet door that you removed.
- Screw the new pulls or knobs into the drawers and cabinets.
  Tighten knobs by hand.
- Go over your cabinets with a wood safe-household cleaner after removing the old hardware to give your cabinets a nice clean look.
